Our Guidelines:

- 1. We encourage critical analysis and critical thinking. Especially where an article discusses a case, we consider those articles that critic the case as opposed to summarizing or narrating the case.
- 2. We want to encourage discussion amongst construction practitioners, so if you refer to a previous article on the ACL Blog, we encourage you to leave a comment on that article to encourage discussion and to hyperlink the particular article to your article.
- 3. The title is the first thing that will catch the reader's attention. So please pay close attention to your title. Our advice, a short punchy title or a question will generate more interest.
- 4. Our target is the busy construction professional and so we encourage our writers to write short articles of between 500- 1500 words (which on average would take a reader 3-7 minutes to read).
- 5. Our articles aim to be easy reads and so we encourage use of plain English that is accurate and clear to get the message across. Avoid jargon.
- 6. Please insert spaces between paragraphs.
- 7. Where you need to refer to a source, please hyperlink the source instead of referencing it in an endnote or a footnote.
- 8. Please submit your article in MS Word format.
- 9. As the author, do include your name, email address, firm, and city of residence.
- 10. Do include five keywords below the title in your article.
- 11. Your article must be original. Where you refer to another person's work in your article make sure you acknowledge your source. We value originality and so if you are collaborating with another publisher on the same article, tell us and we can then decide whether to continue to publish the article.
- 12. When we receive your article, we assume that you have obtained any necessary authorizations if required from your employer; these are entirely your responsibility as the author.
